It's a great personal honour for me to accept this award, It is an honour for my home place of Cork city in Ireland – and indeed, it is an honour for Irish people across the world.

It is extremely special to have the luxury – to be able to work at what I love doing. So, it is very humbling for me to receive – – The World Cultural Council – Leonardo Da Vinci Award of Arts – for effectively following my own heart, indulging my passion and living my dream.

At times such as this I think of those who came before. I'm particularly speaking about my parent's generation.

They lived in comparatively difficult times.

My father and mother brought 12 children into this world.

My Uncle John and Aunty Gretta – had 14 children ...

My mother was born into a family of 10 daughters –

into a small hillside farm on the Beara Peninsula

On the most Westerly point of Europe – jutting out into the wild Atlantic

I think of that generation

And I think of how they willingly and wholeheartedly – set aside their own personal ambitions, their own dreams, their creativity – To pave the way for the next generation – my generation.

To allow me to follow my dream ...

And so, I am honoured to accept this very special award And I would like to dedicate it – to the <u>memory of my mother</u>. Siobhan Blake - Ni bheidh a leithéid ann arís

I am honoured. I am privileged. I am humbled.
